#### **OPEN YOUR HEART**

The year was 1780, and Robert Raikes had a burden for the poor, illiterate children in his London neighborhood. He noticed that nothing was being done to help these children, so he set out to make a difference.

He hired some women to set up schools for them on Sunday. Using the Bible as their textbook, the teachers taught the poorest children of London to read and introduced them to the wisdom of the Bible. Soon about 100 children were attending these classes and enjoying lunch in a safe, clean environment. These "Sunday schools," as they were soon called, eventually touched the lives of thousands of boys and girls. By 1831, Sunday schools in Great Britain reached more than a million children—all because one man understood this truth: "The righteous considers the cause of the poor" (Prov. 29:7 NKJV).

It's no secret that Jesus cares greatly for those who struggle. In Matthew 25, He suggests that followers of Christ show a readiness for the Lord's return by helping the hungry to get food, helping the thirsty to get a drink, helping the homeless to find a home, helping the naked to get clothes, and helping the sick or imprisoned to receive comfort (vv. 35-36).

As we bear witness that Christ is in our hearts, we honor our compassionate Savior by considering those on God's heart.

# Physical and Mental Health

The month of **October** has several causes that are observed and **National Breast Cancer Awareness and Domestic Abuse Awareness** are the most celebrated.

National Breast Cancer Awareness (pink ribbons) – Next to skin cancer, the American Cancer Society states that breast cancer is the most common cancer among women in the United States. Survival rates are increasing due to early detection and improved treatment regimens. Take the time to manage your annual screening and encourage others to do the same.

Domestic Abuse Awareness (Purple ribbons) – Silence is not always golden. In silence, domestic violence can thrive and ruin, even end lives. Though domestic violence is not a new problem in our communities, it is seemingly becoming more prevalent. According to the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence, women between the ages of 18-24 are most commonly abused by an intimate partner; 1 in 3 women and 1 in 7 men have been victims of some form of physical violence by an intimate partner in their lifetime; Domestic victimization is correlated with a higher rate of depression and suicidal behavior. If you are concerned about a friend or loved one, please reach out to them because they may be too afraid to reach out to you.

### Did you know?

Eating an unhealthy diet may play a role in the development of mental health disorders such as ADHD, Alzheimer's disease, and schizophrenia, or in the in the increased suicide in young people. Eating more fruits and vegetables, cooking meals at home, and reducing your fat and sugar intake may help to improve mood and lower your risk for mental health problems. Your overall dietary pattern is key to how you feel, think, and act. Fuel your mind and body with healthier meal and snack options.

# Physical and Mental Health

### Multiple Sclerosis (MS) and African Americans

The time gap between the first MS symptom to getting an MS diagnosis is the same among Caucasians, African Americans, and Latinos.

#### **HOWEVER, Did You Know that African Americans:**

- are more likely to experience Multiple Sclerosis-related depression than Caucasians.
- are more likely to experience more MS relapses.
- are more likely to experience greater disability.
- have a greater risk of progressing to require ambulatory assistance earlier.
- are more likely to develop involvement of the optic nerves and spinal cord (optic spinal MS and inflammation of the spinal cord (transverse myelitis).

Multiple Sclerosis is an unpredictable, often disabling, disease of the central nervous system that interrupts the flow of information within the brain and between the brain and the body. Common symptoms of MS include: fatigue, numbness, difficulty walking or maintaining balance, vision problems, cognition and depression. Most people are diagnosed between the ages of 20 and 50. MS is at least two to three times more common in women than in men. Historically, it was believed that MS was less common in African Americans; however, recent research has revealed that African American women may be at a higher risk of developing MS than was generally believed. In fact, studies further suggest that African Americans experience more relapses and greater disability as a result of the disease.

At the historic 51st National Convention in Washington, DC, the *Multiple Sclerosis and African American Community* Resolution submitted by: Columbia Maryland Alumnae Chapter was passed. As stated: **NOW THERE-FORE BE IT RESOLVED** that Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Incorporated supports the National Multiple Sclerosis Society chapters nationwide to raise the awareness of MS in the African American communities.

Raising awareness about MS and the resources from the National MS Society is critical. The National MS Society is committed to ensuring that African Americans affected by MS can live their best lives. 

# Political Awareness/Social Action



As a reminder, the Primary Election is here. This election cycle includes candidates for Governor, Lt. Governor, Secretary of State, Attorney General, State Legislature, Senate, and BESE Board.

Early voting starts October 10th, (CHAPTER MEETING DAY- Just go after chapter meeting and ends October 17th. You can cast your vote at any Clerk of Court's Office. Election Day is October 24th.

The Political Awareness and Involvement and Social Action Committees will be doing pop up voters information tables at schools on October 12, 13, 14th 11-1pm. Sorors are needed to work the tables. ## Political Awareness/Social Action

#### Things to know before you head to the polls:

You are not required to have a photo ID to vote in Louisiana. If you have a Drivers license, State ID card, or other government issued photo ID, bring it with you to the polls. If you do not have ID or cannot locate your ID, you can still vote. Go to the polling place assigned to you. Let the commissioner know that you would like to complete a Voter Affidavit. Once completed, you should be allowed to vote in a voting booth like all other voters. Do not accept a Provisional Ballot.

**Provisional Ballots are available for anyone whose name cannot be located on the voter roll.** If your name cannot be found at the precinct where you went to vote, ask the Commissioner in Charge to attempt to locate your name at all precincts in your parish. If your name cannot be found but you believe that you are registered to vote, you may request a Provisional Ballot. The Secretary of State will then research your registration status. If you are found to be registered, the Provisional Ballot will be counted. If you are found not to be registered, the Provisional Ballot will not be counted.

If you do not know where you vote, find this information on your voter registration card or on the Secretary of State's website. Occasionally, polling places change. To verify the address and location of your polling place, visit the Louisiana Voter Portal here. (https://voterportal.sos.la.gov)

**To report any problem at the polls, contact your local Clerk of Court.** Each Parish's Clerk of Court has enforcement authority over the administration of elections.

Here are some reasons to call your Parish's Clerk of Court. If you observe these things, report them immediately: 1)You observe electioneering or campaigning within 600ft of a polling place, 2) Voter intimidation, 3) Voters being denied voter affidavits, 4) Voters being denied provisional ballots, and 5) Voters being told that they cannot vote without photo ID.
